ROBOT NANNIES

- A.** Imagine a robot that could undertake the role of a childminder. Given the huge amounts of money paid for childcare, that's a very attractive prospect. In the US, over 60 percent of families with children have both parents working full-time. In China and Japan, the percentage of parents employed outside the home is even higher. Due to long working hours and shifting demographics, these countries have a severe shortage of nannies. Now one company is offering a tempting solution – a child-sized humanoid robot nanny, which can keep children engaged and entertained for hours. According to the manufacturer, its product, called iPal, is selling like hot cakes.
- B.** iPal talks, dances, plays games, reads stories, and plugs into social media and the internet. Over time, it learns a child's likes, dislikes and habits. For example, it can independently learn about subjects your child is interested in to boost learning. There is more: iPal learns to behave like a loving human being because it has an "emotion management system" that detects the child's emotions and mirrors them. The kid responds to the robot as though it actually were a human being, but this is where a problem arises. Robots can't possibly "love" children the way humans do. So researchers are worried about how children's long-term emotional development may be affected by spending so much time with robots.



- C. There are more dark sides to the robot. Although most children love it, some might abuse the helpless machines by hitting and kicking them. The trouble is that the robot can't respond appropriately, so children could get the message that they can behave aggressively without any consequences. This is likely to affect their relationships with people. Another concern is that talking electronic toys don't actually teach kids good communication skills. It's well-known that frequent verbal interactions with parents during the first three years of life boost a child's developing brain. They set the stage for the child's future communication skills.
- D. The inadequacy of robot nannies rests on the programmed emotional responses they have in their repertoires, for example, they're programmed to play a child's favourite song when the child is crying. But such a response could be inappropriate if the child is upset because he or she fell over and scraped a knee. A robot playing a catchy jingle is no substitute for having Mum clean the wound and, perhaps, more importantly, help the child feel better. Most experts believe that robots can be valuable educational tools, but they can't make a child feel truly loved and valued. That's the role of parents.

TRANSPORTING RHINOS

Each year, a selection of apparently weird scientific experiments receives the Ig Nobel Prize, which is awarded to honour projects that “first make people laugh, and then make them think.” **5.1.** _____ It won the award in 2021 and involved suspending 12 black rhinos upside down by their ankles from a helicopter. But while hanging rhinos make for spectacularly absurd photographs, the procedure is, in fact, all about their survival.

Sadly, black rhinos in Africa are on the brink of extinction. In the 1960s, more than 100,000 black rhinos lived in the wild, but 30 years of illegal hunting wiped out 98% of the animals. By the mid-1990s, only about 2,300 black rhinos remained. **5.2.** _____ However, despite this success, the fight must go on. To protect rhinos from poachers*, who are the main threat to the animals, they are kept within fenced reservation areas. But this prevents the animals from colonizing new areas or mixing genes by finding mates living in different areas. So conservationists sometimes have to move rhinos. Most rhino relocations are carried out with trucks, but some remote locations can't be reached by road. **5.3.** _____ Typically, the rhino is hung upside down by its ankles. But until the Ig Nobel Prize-winning study, no one had ever established whether this upside-down transportation is actually safe for the rhinos involved.

This is where science comes in. The winning study compared the effects on bodily functions when rhinos were hung by their ankles to when the same animals were lying on their sides. The researchers found rhinos hung upside down can breathe more easily than when rhinos are laid on their sides. **5.4.** _____ But, unfortunately, we have no choice. If we are to save endangered species, we can't simply leave them to themselves. They either need to be moved to where they are safe from poaching, or to new areas where there are no rhinos.

We want the rhinos to survive the relocation procedure, and to have as strong and healthy immune and reproductive systems as possible on their release. **5.5.** _____ No matter how absurd this method may seem, we need to use the safest way of transporting them.

ONE OF THOSE DAYS

It had begun with me oversleeping, which meant that my cat, who's called Bob, and I were already running late when we set off to catch the bus near my flat in north London on our way to Islington, where I sold a magazine called *The Big Issue*.

We were barely five minutes into our journey when things went from bad to worse. The bus was suddenly filled with a burning smell. Within seconds, the panicked driver announced that our journey was being "terminated". There was a lot of chaotic pushing, but Bob didn't seem to be in a rush, so we were among the last to get off, which, as it turned out, was a wise decision. The bus may have smelled awful, but at least it was warm. We had stopped opposite a building site, from where icy winds were blowing. The crisis turned out to be nothing more serious than an overheated engine, but the driver had to wait for a bus company mechanic to come and fix it. So, amid much grumbling, we were left standing on the freezing cold pavement while we waited for a replacement bus.

When it finally arrived, the late morning traffic was terrible, so by the time Bob and I hopped off at Islington Green, we had been on the road for more than an hour and a half. That meant I was going to miss the lunchtime rush, one of the best times for selling the magazine. And as usual, the five-minute walk to our pitch at Angel Tube station was a stop-start affair. We could never walk more than ten yards without someone wanting to stroke Bob. When we finally got to the station, I put my rucksack on the pavement so that Bob could spread out on it, and then I started laying out the magazines I'd bought from the local *The Big Issue* co-ordinator the previous day. I'd set myself the target of selling at least a couple of dozen but I soon became frustrated again. Steely clouds had been hovering above London since mid-morning, and before I'd managed to sell a single magazine, the heavens opened, forcing Bob and me to run for shelter in an underpass near some office buildings.

Unsurprisingly, fewer people than usual stopped to make a fuss over Bob, so I sold fewer magazines. As if the day wasn't going badly enough, a police officer started asking nosy questions. It wasn't the first time, but I really didn't need the hassle. I knew the law: I was entitled to sell magazines at this spot from dawn till dusk unless I was causing a public nuisance. I also had my registered vendor ID with me. Sadly, he didn't seem to have anything better to do and insisted on searching me, but found nothing suspicious. He wasn't pleased about that, so he started asking questions about Bob. I proved that the cat was legally registered to me, and he walked off with a look as grim as the weather.

By early evening, when the office workers had gone home, I decided to do the same. I'd barely sold ten magazines and collected only a fraction of what I'd normally make. I'd spent long enough living off tins of reduced-price beans and even cheaper loaves of bread to know that I wouldn't starve, and I had some savings to top up the gas and electric meters as well. But it meant I'd probably need to head out to work again over the weekend, something I hadn't wanted to do. As I sat on the bus home, I could feel the first signs of flu in my bones. By now the sky had turned inky black and the streetlights were on full blaze.

Dude is a living embodiment of the museum's dynamic culture. He doesn't just passively exist in this space; he actively participates in its daily operations. In addition to being a regular door greeter who welcomes museum-goers, Dude has other responsibilities. He specializes in rodent control and boosting staff morale. It's also not uncommon to see him doing the rounds as the museum's "Snoopervisor", making sure everything is as it should be. The celebration of his "unofficial birthday" is held on the day that he was adopted, March 8th. That's when Dude also celebrates his work anniversary with his human co-workers at the museum. On that day fans from around the world send him birthday wishes through social media platforms.

Dude has gained such celebrity status at the museum that visitors can even buy a button souvenir with his face on it and a series of books, *Dude, the Museum Cat* by Christopher Hayden.
